


Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord,


[bowing:] who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary,

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.



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Memorial Acclamation from "Missa Oecumenica"




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Great Amen from "Missa Oecumenica"
