- On all Fridays during Lent, we abstain from meat (obligatory for those in good health 14 and older).

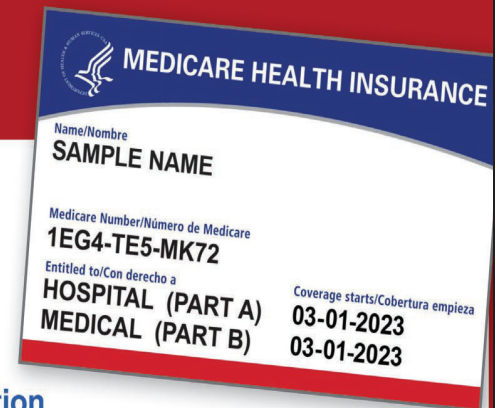
